War Department, A. G. O., November 11, 1929. - To The Adjutant General, State of Texas, Austin, Texas.

1. The name Andrew Butler Ledbetter has not been found on the rolls on file in this office of Company I, 10th Texas Infantry, Confederate States Army, covering the period from January 16, 1862, to April 30, 1864. John A. Formwalt was captain of this company.

The records show, however, that one Andrew Ledbetter, borne also as Andrew J. Ledbetter, Company I, 10th Texas Infantry, C. S. A., enlisted January 16, 1862, at Kimball (also shown as enlisted at Hillican). The muster roll covering the period from December 31, 1862, to June 30, 1863, reports him absent, "Trans-Miss. Dept.", date not shown, a private. His name appears on subsequent muster rolls to and including October 31, 1863, as absent in Trans-Miss. Dept. The muster rolls covering the period from November, 1863, to April 30, 1864 (the latest roll on file) show him as absent in Trans-Miss. Dept., on sick furlough in Johnson County, Texas (also shown as Johnson Co., Arkansas). Nothing further in regard to him as of this organization is found of record.

> It is further shown by the records that one A. B. Ledbetter served as a private of Company D, 17th Consolidated Texas Dismounted Cavalry, C.S.A. The only roll on file for this organization is that for January and February, 1864, which shows him a private present. This regiment was a field organization formed July 1, 1863, in the Trans-Miss. Department, principally of men who had formerly belonged to the 10th Texas Infantry, and other Confederate States Army organizations who had not been captured at Arkansas Post, Arkansas, January 11, 1863.

No record of capture, parole or any later record for this soldier is found.

2. From the information furnished it has not been found possible to positively identify the military record of John Morris or to identify the Captain McKinney or General Quantrel referred to.

> However, the records show that one John Morris, who may or may not be the man referred to, born in Cork County, Ireland, enlisted September 4, 1865, at Albany, New York; was assigned to Troop D, 2nd United States Cavalry, and was honorably discharged September 4, 1868, at Deer Creek, Dakota Territory, by reason of expiration of term of service, a sergeant. He again enlisted May 20, 1869, at Brownsville, Texas, for Troop K, 4th United States Cavalry, and deserted March 15, 1870, at Fort Brown, Texas, a corporal. He never returned to military control

> 3. It is further shown by the records that John A. McKinney graduated at the Military Academy June 12, 1871, and served with Troop K, 4th Cavalry, at Victoria, Texas, from December 23, 1871, to February, 1872, as 2nd lieutenant.
