Subject: Ranger Pension.

1. Replying to your letter of Sept. 7, 1918, the Jas. E. McCord, 1st Lieutenant, (Burleson's Company) was mustered into service by Capt. J. M. W. Hall on Jan. 30, 1860. (no place mentioned.)

Captain Ed. Burleson's company was mustered out and honorably discharged from the service of the State on the 7th of Sept., 1860, at San Marcos, Texas. Jos. Walker was the mustering officer who discharged the company.

2. A certificate as to the correctness of the roll, signed by E. Burleson, is dated Jan. 30, 1860, and the station is Beaver Camp. This may or may not have been the place where the company was mustered in.
